9} But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him Who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light. 10} Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy. 11} Beloved, I urge you as sojourners and exiles to abstain from the passions of the flesh, which wage war against your soul. 12} Keep your conduct among the Gentiles honorable, so that when they speak against you as evildoers, they may see your good deeds and glorify God on the day of visitation.

(1 Peter 2:9-12 ESV)

LET'S PLAY THE OLD WORD ASSOCIATION GAME. I'll say "MINISTRY". What is the first word that pops into your mind? (No cheating by reading ahead in this article!) Did you right away think "Pastor"? How about if I say "Place of ministry". Did you first think "church" or "Sunday School"? I would guess that few of you thought of "NSWC" or "Northrop-Grumman" or "United States Navy" or "King George High School" or "the Golf course" or "home" or "in the car" - wherever you spend most of your time.

In the Bible passage printed above, Jesus' Apostle Peter calls all Christians "Royal Priests" who are to proclaim the praises of God. Those of us who by God's grace "have received mercy", are urged to be positive examples to the world around us. Peter tells us to live among unchristian people so that they may see our good deeds and glorify God, and not have any evidence to accuse us of doing wrong. We show that by how we SERVE others. Ministry is simply the fancy church word for "**SERVICE**". We serve God by living as His people in our everyday lives. God does call a few of us to full time work as "pastor / teacher" whose jobs are to "equip the saints for the work of ministry" (Eph. 4:11-12). The real "ministers" however, are all of you who strive to live for Jesus in all that you do, in every place that God has put you.

Many, if not most Christians are not comfortable with the idea that they are ". . . to represent God to the people and to pray to God on behalf of the people." (*Ministry in Daily Life*, by William E. Diehl, page 11). Yet that is what priests do, and we are all God's priests. "That's a tough job" you say? You're right! It is much easier to relegate Ministry to the place of worship or to the person of the pastor. But consider what God says, "Each one should

retain the place in life that the Lord assigned to him or her and to which God has called him or her". (1 Cor. 7:17). Clergy are not the only ones who are "called". Your divine call is to live as God's representative to those around you. That's your place of ministry. William Diehl (see book mentioned above) says that we can divide our ministry into four "arenas"; occupation (more than just paying jobs, but whatever "occupies" most of our time and energy), family, community, and church. God has placed us in these arenas in order that we might be His means of reaching people with His message of salvation. As we declare God's love through deeds of kindness and words of hope, the Holy Spirit will work in the hearts of those who receive our ministry. I pray that God would use all of you to "minister" to people around you, who need Jesus to make a difference in their lives.

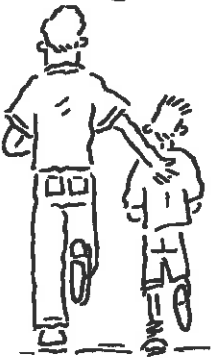

New Dinner Schedule for 2017

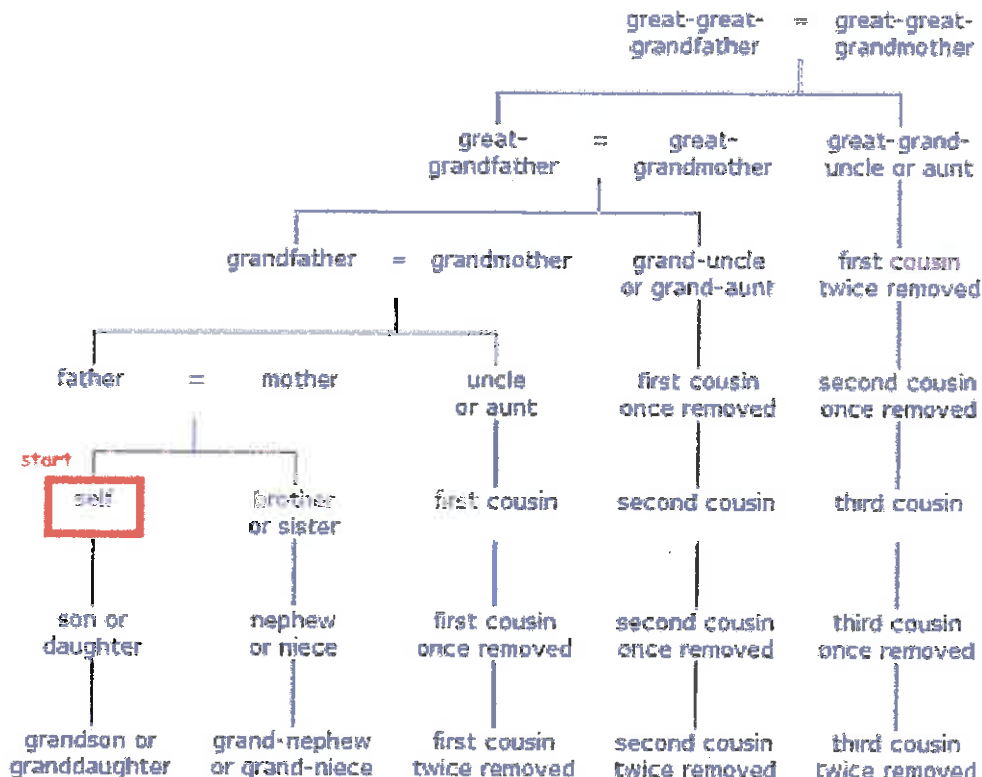

Confirmation, Statement of Faith
A Decision

March 22, 2017

For my confirmation verse, I choose Matthew 28:20 "Lo, I am with you always, even until the end of the world." (KJV) It is comforting to know that God has always been with me and will always be with me. Verse 19 and the beginning of verse 20, in Mathew 28, tells us to "go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." In order to do this, we must believe in God and understand His teachings. What does it mean to believe in God? According to Luther's Small Catechism, "It means I trust God and His promises and accept as true all He teaches in the Holy Scriptures" (102). I know there is a God who can be seen through the design in all things on Earth, the moral standards in society, and the faith in God's word, the Bible.

Look at nature and you see beautiful design. You can see it in animals. Bees use specific dances to communicate (Richards 141). Graceful gazelles have a cooling system in their brains to cool them down while escaping enemies (Richards 134). Also, army ants build nests out of living worker ants to protect the eggs since the colony is always moving (Richards 143). This does not happen by chance, but by the design of a thoughtful creator. Definitely there is order to our universe which can be seen in the natural laws such as the laws of motion and the laws of thermodynamics. As Thomas Aquinas stated, "Nothing can cause itself" (Price 33). Hebrews 3:4 "Every house is built by someone, but God is the builder of everything." Just as a house has a creator, the universe does too.

Morals are defined as standards in society "concerned with principles of right and wrong" (vocabulary.com). People in societies around the world have rules, laws, and behavioral standards. Additionally, the common standards such as honesty, trustworthiness, and kindness are universal even for nonbelievers. These are called God's natural laws. Why do these morals and values exist? Moral standards are based off of a perfect being, but man is not perfect (Price 33). Therefore, we must have been given these morals by some being of perfection, a miraculous creator. We would not have these morals if not for God. These moral standards are shown and taught in the Bible through the many parables of Jesus, the 10 Commandments, Proverbs, and other books. "The Lord detests lying lips, but he delights in people who are trustworthy." Proverbs 12:22. C. S. Lewis wrote, "Really great moral teachers never do introduce new moralities" (82). In other words, these moral values have always been evident because God is always with us. The Moral values of God are clearly indicated in Galatians 5:22-23, "But the fruit

of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Against such things there is no law.”

God’s word, the Bible, makes His salvation known to us. In the Bible, we constantly see God telling us to believe in him. “You shall have no other Gods before me” Exodus 20:3, which means “that you are to fear and love God” (Luther 13). God provides for us. Psalm 145: 15-16 “The eyes of all look to you and you give them their food at the proper time. You open your hand and satisfy the desires of every living thing.” Commanding us to believe, God makes himself known. “The Heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands” Psalm 19:1. God gave us Jesus to die for our sins so we can have everlasting life. Through Jesus, we have faith that we, as believers, are saved. Romans 1: 19-20:

“What may be known about God is plain to them because God has made it plain to them. For since the creation of the world God’s invisible qualities-his eternal power and divine nature-have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made, so that men are without excuse.”

To share God with others of all nations, you can use faith in the scriptures as you look to the designs in creation and the moral values in society. Thomas Aquinas, back in the 13th century, taught that we can know God through both faith and reason. Because I know that in Christ God is always with me, I can promise to remain faithful to Father, Son, and Holy Spirit until he calls me home to heaven. We all have a decision to make. For me the decision is clear. God will be with me always, “even unto the end of the world.” (Matthew 28:20). “[God] desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth” 1 Timothy 2:4.

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INTERNATIONAL THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION — JUNE 1-15 Theological education is one of the seven mission priorities of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS), and it forms an integral part of LCMS mission work around the world. The Synod's theological education efforts take various forms in different contexts to effectively meet people's specific needs around the world.

Remember God's work through international theological education as you pray:

- 1.** for the Synod's Global Seminary Initiative (GSI), which helps fill the need for trained church leaders who are native to the regions and cultures in which they serve. Pray that God would guide this program to strengthen the formation of pastors and deaconesses around the world.
- 2.** for the safety and well-being of LCMS professors and pastors who travel overseas to teach seminars and intensive courses for our current and emerging church partners.
- 3.** for the international students who come to the Synod's seminaries to study, that God would grant them safe travels and comfort while away from family and friends.
- 4.** that Lutheran pastors all over the world would have access to the necessary books and resources to equip them for the proper teaching of Law and Gospel.
- 5.** with thanksgiving for the Synod's generous donors, who make it possible for the LCMS to support theological education in many different locations around the world.
- 6.** for the health and safety of LCMS missionaries who live and work in foreign lands to help strengthen the theological education taking place there. Give thanks to God that these faithful families have heeded His call to serve their brothers and sisters in Christ in this way.
- 7.** for the ministry carried out through the Westfield House of Theological Studies in Cambridge, England. This ministry trains church leaders for England and many other church bodies around the world.
- 8.** for the Lutheran Center for Theological Studies (CLEF) in Togo, which provides theological training for men from French-speaking countries in West Africa.
- 9.** for projects that translate Christian materials into the heart language of different people groups. Pray especially for the ongoing work of translating Luther's Works into Chinese that is taking place in Hong Kong.
- 10.** that God would bless the work of all those He calls into the ministry around the world.

- 11.** for the new deaconess formation program in the Dominican Republic. Please ask God to bless the work of the LCMS deaconesses serving as missionaries in Latin America who are overseeing this program.
- 12.** for opportunities for fellowship and continuing education for Lutheran church workers in Europe, who are spread out over a large geographic area.
- 13.** for the seminaries of LCMS partner churches around the world. Pray that they would faithfully educate future leaders for their churches.
- 14.** with thanksgiving for the Gospel multiplication that happens when pastors are equipped to teach their flocks and train new leaders for the church.
- 15.** that God would continue to grow His Church on earth. Pray that the Lord would continue to raise up church planters and mission developers according to His good and gracious will.

NEW MISSIONARIES — JUNE 16-30 The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) has been sending missionaries around the world since 1895, when the Synod's first missionary traveled to India. Today, the LCMS trains, sends and supports called and appointed career, long-term and short-term missionaries in various countries around the world where there are mission stations, partner churches, schools or mission relationships.

Remember God's work through the Synod's new missionaries as you pray:

- 16.** for missionary families who are in the process of building their network of support. Although it is a necessary step toward their deployment to the field, this time can be stressful on families.
- 17.** for missionary families who are in the process of learning a new language for their upcoming service. Pray that God would provide perseverance for this task and skilled teachers to guide and encourage them.
- 18.** for new missionaries as they prepare to move to a new place of service. There are many things to take care of during this transition, including visas, vaccinations, earthly possessions, pets, and housing and schooling options in a new place.
- 19.** for all missionaries who are setting into new surroundings. Pray that God would send new friends and understanding helpers during this time.
- 20.** for Jesus' love to shine boldly through all LCMS missionaries and personnel as they meet new people and make new friends.
- 21.** for missionaries who are struggling with visa issues that are preventing them from settling in their country of service. Please ask God to either smooth the way or open up new opportunities in another location, according to His will.
- 22.** for the children of new missionaries, who will face culture shock and unknown challenges. Praise God for the special role that children play in building relationships with new people and for the simple way they witness to their friends and neighbors about Jesus Christ.
- 23.** that God would raise up even more missionaries to serve Him through acts of witness and mercy around the world.

24. that God would sustain the health of new missionaries and their family members as they face stressful situations and new illnesses in new places.

25. for the Synod's national missionaries, many of whom are working in challenging inner-city settings. Ask the Lord to encourage and refresh them to do His work.

26. that these new missionaries would find fellowship and support among the other new missionaries and the regional teams they will be working with.

27. that God would grant peace and comfort to the loved ones who are saying "goodbye" to those who are being sent. Pray that God would relieve feelings of anxiety and sadness over separation from family and friends.

28. that the Church would embrace the Synod's missionaries. Pray that through LCMS members, God would provide what is needed at the right time.

29. for safe travels for those attending New Missionary Orientation, which starts July 3. Orientation provides intensive training in many different areas of the missionary experience.

30. that orientation would energize, encourage and equip these missionaries for their new roles on the mission field.
